larly nice touch was when, at the Peace, Claire and Philip (who married at St Peter's last May) distributed




chocolates to the congregation. (Yes, heart shaped ones!) We certainly hope that this special Sunday will become a regular addition to our worship calendar.

The Lady Day Parish Walk


